Bulldogs Win Awards at NWTC Tech Challenge

On Friday, April 12th, fourteen students competed at the Northeast Wisconsin Technical College (NWTC) Tech Challenge. This year's results were the best to date as our team swept all Machine Tool Display awards, while the Parametric Modeling team received many awards for proficiency. This was also the first time New London had Scholarship winners in three



different categories. These scholarships to NWTC in Green Bay are worth as much as \$1,000 for full-time students and \$500 if the scholarship winner is enrolled part-time in the year after graduation.

In the Functional Fabrication display competition, Noah Crampton earned his second scholarship this year (Machine Tool Display winner last year) for his entry of a replacement part for a milling machine. In class, Noah was given the task to take a broken part, put it back together, measure it, redesign it with more strength and better material and finally make the part. The part was tested in the milling machine successfully and removed for the sake of competition. After winning, the part was put back into the machine where it should stay for many years.

In the Machine Tool display category, students entered machining projects to be judged on complexity, accuracy, and quality of craftsmanship. Projects entered included model steam engines, a glow engine, body man and meat tenderizing hammer and a drive adapter for winding floor covering. Leading the Machine Tool team were scholarship winners Ethan Kurowski and John Heuer. They were joined in the eventual sweep by Tim Zuehls (Gold), Matthew Kurszewski (Silver) and Devan Kratzke (Bronze).

In the Parametric Modeling competition, students competed head to head with students from other schools in North East Wisconsin. Students were given a drawing to complete and were judged based on the accuracy of the drawing and in the event of a tie, the time taken to complete the drawing would determine the winner. Brooks Griffin and Dillon Daul were



offered scholarships based on their performance in the competition. Other students earning gold level proficiency recognition were Riley Titterton and Noah Crampton. They were joined by silver medalists Kendra Bowden, Katrena Campbell and Caleb Lauer.

Jump Rope for Heart

February was Heart Health month and the students of Sugar Bush and Lincoln did their part to save a heart! On Wednesday, February 20th and Friday, February 22nd students took part in Jump Rope for Heart (Kids Heart Challenge) through the American Heart Association. The 3rd and 4th graders created routines while Kindergarten through 2nd grade students showed off their grade level skills. Students even had time for some team parachute action. Students worked hard to prepare for this day and some raised funds for students just like them that have heart defects. Way to go Sugar Bush and Lincoln students!

Students Witness Government in Action

For the 59th consecutive year, Waupaca County high school students convened for County Youth Government Day in Waupaca on April 25th. Twenty-four New London 9th graders attended the event thanks to the generosity of both Waupaca County American Legion members as well as Waupaca County employees. The day affords youth opportunities to learn about state and local government and, by doing so, promotes citizenship and effective government.

Students heard from a number of speakers over the course of the day: Wisconsin Representative Kevin Petersen, American Legion Department of Wisconsin Adjutant Amber Nikolai, Waupaca County Chairman Dick Koeppen, Waupaca County Emergency Management Director Andrew Carlin, American Legion Waupaca County Council Commander Willis Pope, County Youth Government Day Chairman Arien Herminath, and the Honorable Raymond Huber, Circuit Court Judge, Branch III. Their dedication to public service was evident and greatly appreciated.

Perhaps the most memorable voices of County Youth Government Day, however, belong to the students themselves. Twenty-four students were asked the following question: "What was the most memorable part of County Youth Government Day?" Their responses provide insight into what they found most interesting and provide inspiration that the future of our county and our country are in good hands.

Willow Carmody-Coleman: "The most memorable part of County Youth Government Day was getting such an astounding opportunity to view the aspects of our own little government. Learning about something online is so much different from getting to experience it first hand. Meeting with a county judge, speaking to deputies, and getting an understanding of just how crucial the county government was really amazing in every way. I enjoyed every part of this day, and would do it over again a thousand times."

Emma Desrochers: "The most memorable part of County Youth Government Day for me was the mock trial. It gave me a chance to see what it would really be like to be an attorney. I got to question a witness,

I won the case, and the driver in the case was found guilty. Another part of Youth Government Day that was memorable was getting to see the 911 call center and meeting the police dogs. Overall it was a great learning experience."

Mara Doran: "The most memorable part of County Youth Government Day was seeing real people doing their real jobs. I didn't think that many people were needed to work for the county, but now I realize how essential each and every person in the county building is. The mock trial was a fun experience. The jail was interesting and I liked the officers we met (and the dog). It was very fun and neat to explore something new"

Maribel Glodowski: "The most memorable part of County Youth Government Day was the mock trial that was held. My friends and I found ourselves debating over whether we thought the verdict should have been guilty after the trial was completed. One thing that surprised me about this trial was the fact that there was no easy decision. Most of the things said could not easily be classified as a right or wrong. This is what made it so difficult to get a unanimous verdict."

Garrison Gregory: "The most memorable part of County Youth Government Day was looking at the jail cameras. It was interesting to see the process of registering new inmates and how they acted while in the jail cells. Most of the inmates were either looking out of a window in the cell door or sleeping."

Allyson Hoffman: "The most memorable part of County Youth Government Day was being able to learn new things about the government. I went into this thinking I knew a lot of information on government topics, but I ended up gaining a lot of knowledge. It made me really take into consideration working in one of those jobs. The most interesting part was the 911 dispatcher room. Now I understand the procedure for every call they get. Overall, I learned a lot and it was an amazing experience."

Devan Kratzke: "The one thing that I thought was most interesting was the 911 center. I thought it would be a big room full of a lot of people and computers. It only has four areas where the workers sit as they answer calls that come in. Each area

has around six computers that tell them the coordinates of the person that is calling, as well as the radio frequencies that they are able to use if they need to talk to a certain area."

Payton Ludick: "The most memorable part of County Youth Government Day was getting to see the 911 call room. It was very cool to see all the 911 operators responsibilities and how they do their work. It was very interesting when one of the operators got a call while we were in the room. It was the most memorable part of the trip for me."

John Mariano: "The most memorable part of County Youth Government Day was when we toured the Law Enforcement Center. One thing that I never knew was that the term 'jail' was only meant for county imprisonment, and the term 'prison' is for state or federal imprisonment. Truly the time that I spent on this day was memorable. I thank all that made this day possible."

Chasen Pfefferle: "The most memorable part of County Youth Government Day was Amber Nikolai's speech. She is the American Legion State adjutant. The reason her speech was very impactful because she described the symbolism of the flag and reasons to be happy that you are American."

Emily Rutzinski: "The most memorable part of County Youth Government Day was learning the education and background needed for different jobs and areas in local government. This information is very important to me as I plan and learn for future job fields."

Keyarra Schilpp: "The most memorable part of County Youth Government Day was when County Board Chairman Dick Koeppen said that he entered politics 'for the wrong reason.' That stuck with me -- how he did something for the wrong reason, but looking at where he is in life now, it really was his destiny."
