MATHEMATICS



## Parkview Joins The Hour of Code Campaign

Hour of Code is a National Event that takes place each year during Computer Science week in December. The purpose of the event is to encourage students and teachers to take part in learning how to code computers, or speak computer language. Schools from all across the nation take part in it each year, and this year Parkview decided to join the initiative.



Parkview does a fantastic job with getting technology into the students' hands. The students use technology on a regular basis in many ways to enhance learning, but this is a little different. Using the Hour of Code is actually about learning how to write code for the computer itself. What is code you may ask? Code is the language that computers communicate with and our children are growing up in a world where everything is based around computer language and code. The staff decided to take part in the campaign.

Each classroom used Hour of Code differently. This program is quite large and has many possibilities. There are several options for how it can be utilized for games, videos, and courses. During that campaign week, many of the teachers used their SMART Boards to demonstrate how a lesson may go and the class worked together. The Kindergartners asked their 4th



grade buddies to join them to be their helpers and to show them how to get through their lessons. Some groups chose to start with unplugged lessons (off-line) to discuss and make sense of the lessons before going online. All in all, the students had a wonderful time learning how to become engaged in writing computer language in a non-threatening way. They have now followed up with course work that follow step-by-step lessons via tutorials. The students are becoming computer scientists and programmers and having a blast doing it. They have even been visited by Steph Curry, Mark Zuckerberg, President Obama, Serena Williams, and Ashton Kutcher through these tutorials. The students can now continue their journey with their accounts online on their own time both in and out of school. They can code through the course work as well as play the games any time they would like. These courses start Pre-K and go through the High School level so hopefully this will prepare them for a future that they will one day use in the workforce.

Coding is a skill that each of our students is going to need to be successful upon graduation, just like Reading and Math. Hopefully, these fun and engaging programs will carry Parkview students right into some wonderful software engineering careers.

### STUDENTS LEARN TO LEAD

You are certainly aware of United Way and the YMCA. There are numerous ways both of these organizations improve the lives of many in our communities. Have you heard about the Teen Symposium? The United Way Fox Cities Youth Board and the YMCA of the Fox Cities generously sponsored the 19th annual Teen Symposium at the Red Lion Hotel Paper Valley in Appleton on February 11th, and New London High School is one of the beneficiaries of this event.

Over 275 9th graders from seventeen area high schools participated in activities and listened to speakers with one important goal in mind -- to empower youth to become student leaders in their schools and future leaders of businesses and nonprofits in their communities. Mandi Dornfeld, coordinator of the Teen Symposium, said it best: "Only youth can change youth culture. Adults can guide the process, but youth must lead the process." Eighteen New London ninth graders were selected by their Freshmen Academy teachers to become those agents of change -- Brooke Casey, Emma Desrochers, Olivia Dreas, Claire Duch, Riley Fischer, Sawyer Kohl, Joseph Krause, Payton Ludick, Sadie Maus, Paris Oglesby, Daniel Olea, Sophia Peterson, Keagan Reybrock, Emily Rutzinski, Keyarra Schilpp, Abby Wegner-Magolski, Alaena Wolf, and Raven Young-Procknow. Teachers Rachel Gard and Brian Mathu joined the students throughout the Teen Symposium.

After participating in welcome activities and attending breakout sessions, students listened to keynote speaker Steve Jones, Head Football Coach and Leadership Teacher at Kimberly High School. Jones related how giant timber bamboo requires three years of watering during which it shows little growth. Then, and only then, it will shoot upwards ninety feet in only sixty days. Jones used "water the bamboo" as a metaphor for the deliberate and patient process that ultimately leads to individual and team growth.

Participating students were also asked to bring non-perishable food items to be donated to a Fox Valley food pantry. Each school built a "can sculpture" with their donated food. Despite only being 6% of the students in attendance, New London students brought 40% of the donated food. Their four-foot pyramid of 400 cans of soup was admirable. The students want to thank NLHS faculty and staff who contributed \$145 toward the worthy cause.

Students had a great time at the event. "Teen Symposium was amazing for me," said Raven Young-Procknow. "I met so many new people and laughed so hard. I learned many new things about how to take control of my future and how to be a great leader. I really, really enjoyed it."

"At the Teen Symposium I had a lot of fun meeting new people and learning about different and new opportunities to help in the community," noted Emily Rutzinski.

Daniel Olea added, "I learned that you can't make a difference in everyone's life, but you can make a significant difference in one life."

Joseph Krause summarized the experience nicely, saying, "This trip really allowed us students to work together in an environment different than what we are used to. I truly believe that this experience has motivated and granted us the ability to make our community and school a better place."

There will be numerous leadership opportunities in the coming months and years for these eighteen students. In fact, when these New London freshmen become sophomores, they will lead the "Freshmen First Day" on September 3, 2019, guiding the new ninth graders as they transition to New London High School.

During his keynote address, Jones correctly noted "Leadership is not earned or learned in a moment." Six hours at the Teen Symposium will not automatically turn students into leaders. But, like watering bamboo, developing young leaders takes time ... and yields surprising and fantastic results.
