The School District of New London began its journey towards building leadership capacity within its staff members and school community on June 15, 2022. The goal was to support the development of a new "Continuous Improvement Strategic Plan" using a framework that emphasizes continuous improvement. The leadership discussions laid the foundation for establishing a language, culture, and process that fosters directed strategic growth within the District. To create and support the development of the continuous improvement strategic plan. six critical mindsets were identified as the foundation.

After conducting a thorough review to reaffirm the District's current mission, vision, and guiding principles, four additional strategic core areas were identified to promote continuous improvement and progress monitoring.

To help achieve the newly established "Indicators of Success," Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) were defined to identify critical focus areas to achieve the best results. A rating percentage system was established to track annual progress and outcomes by regularly monitoring the identified (KPIs).

The School District of New London recently held the first Child Find process of the year on Thursday, October 12, 2023. Over 30 families participated in this great event. The next screening is coming up in January. The date will be held on Thursday, January 25, 2024 at Lincoln Elementary. To make an appointment, please call Molly Brown at (920) 982-8447.

The event will take place from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at Lincoln Elementary School. This developmental screening is designed for children 2½ to 4 years old. Appointment slots are still available.

The screening process allows children to separate from their parents to participate in a play-based screening to observe speech/language, cognition, gross and fine motor, and self-help skills. During the screening, parents are able to chat with our elementary principals and then will be directed to our community area to speak with our school nurse, 4K staff, and is gather other informational resources. The Lions Club is also on-hand at the event to offer free vision screenings to all the children who participate. This event is held annually twice per year in the months of October and January.

Sugar Bush Elementary opened its doors after a significant remodel project just in time to welcome students and staff to the 2023-24 school year. Families and the community were given the big reveal at Open House on September 5, 2023.

Sugar Bush Elementary was built in 1963 and has had some recent remodel projects, but this summer was a major project including new energy efficient windows, updated heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC), casework in all classrooms, new sinks in classrooms, updated electrical distribution, and teaching spaces, carpet throughout and hard surfaces replaced in classrooms and areas in need. A major highlight and huge hit is the remodel of student bathrooms as well as a handicap accessible bathroom which doubled the size of the original facility. The project also replaced all asphalt and portions of concrete both in parking areas and on the playground.




