We are pleased to welcome back Holy Schweitzer for her second term on the Board of Education, as well as new member Andy Thorpe. Per Wisconsin Statute Secs 120.06(4) and 120.42(2), new Board members are not legally able to take office until the fourth Monday of April (April 28). As Board meetings have been rescheduled to Wednesdays, and the fourth Wednesday in April falls before the fourth Monday, the first Board meeting that new members will be able to attend will be on May 14, 2025.

<u>High School Student Get Hands on Experience</u> <u>With Spring Election</u>

Juniors from New London High School received an up-close, hands-on civics lesson just days before the spring election. On March 24, as part of their American Government classes, 11th grade students visited the city council chambers in the New London Municipal Building. There, New London City Clerk Nicole Ryerson guided them through the voting process and provided an overview of the city's electronic voting equipment.

Clerk Ryerson welcomed the students to the chambers and began the Election Day tutorial by displaying a map of the city's districts, including the five aldermanic districts, 12 wards, and four county supervisory districts. She explained how optical scan voting machines function to accurately tabulate

ballots and unlocked a voting machine to show where paper ballots are securely stored after being cast. To give students a practical demonstration, she provided pre-marked "practice" ballots, showing how the voting machine detects ballots with write-in candidates or those marked incorrectly.



Legislative Forum Held on March 31, 2025

On Monday, March 31, State Senators Rachel Cabral-Guevara and Cory Tomczyk, along with State Representatives David Murphy, Kevin Peterson, Joel Kitchens, Brent Jacobson, and Elijah Behnke, met with school board members and school administrators from the New London, Manawa, Weyauwega-Fremont, Marion, and Wild Rose school districts at New London High School.

The meeting provided an opportunity for school board members to engage directly with state legislators, sharing both local successes and key priorities. Discussions focused on funding sustainability, school safety, academic achievement, and teacher recruitment.

Americanism to the American Legion Auxiliary. The American Legion Auxiliary comprises nearly 1 million members in 7,500 local units throughout the United States. Originally organized to assist The American Legion, the Auxiliary today volunteers tens of thousands of hours to its communities and to veterans, and it raises millions of dollars to support its programs and countless other charities.

Additionally, the American Legion Auxiliary promotes Americanism to today's youth through its annual Americanism essay contest. "Americanism" can be defined as "promoting an understanding and appreciation of American government, the rights and responsibilities of American citizenship, and activity in the American way of life." Through the Auxiliary's essay contest, high school students are asked to write a 450-500 word essay that exemplifies these ideals. This year's essay prompt was: "What does America the Beautiful mean to me (regarding veterans and our military)?"



Three New London High School students were recently recognized as this year's top Americanism essay writers. Members of New London's American Legion Auxiliary Unit 263 read the student submissions and determined the "bronze," "silver," and "gold" -- Shaye Allen (3rd place), Tyson Luedtke (2nd place), and Djunie Langel (1st place). The Auxiliary awarded \$25, \$20, and \$15 to these three writers, and Langel's essay was entered in the Auxiliary's statewide contest.

Total Compensation Committee Meetings

4K Outreach Upcoming Events
4K Day of Fun Event

On Friday, April 11, 2025, we anticipate approximately 100 people (students, families, and staff) to attend our 4K Literacy Round Up event at the Washington Center. Students who are three and four years old and their families can come to attend and participate in our literacy event. The event involves the 4K teaching staff from our district, as well as our collaborative partners—Head Start and Day Care Center of New London. Students are able to engage in projects involving literacy, gross motor activities, fine motor activities, math—specifically number identification, sorting, patterns, counting and more and family engagement. The staff will receive assistance from the 8th grade student council students as well as the Catalyst Academy staff and students.

4K/5K Family Visitation Day

On Friday, May 2, 2025, the district will host 4K/5K

visitation day in all of the elementary schools. All New London families with children ages 3 and older are encouraged to attend. Parents will learn more about what 4K and 5K is all about, be able to see the classrooms and



instructional areas, and ask questions they may have about their own children. Additionally, families will also receive a bulldog t-shirt for attending this event.

Director of Teaching and Learning

On Wednesday, April 3, the Board of Education Policy Committee convened to initiate discussions on the development of a student grade-level promotion policy in response to the State of Wisconsin's Act 20. By July 1, 2025, all school boards and independent charter schools are required to adopt a promotion policy for students transitioning from 3rd to 4th grade that meets, at a minimum, the requirements outlined in Wis. Stat. §§ 118.33(6)(a)3. and (6)(b)2m. The policy must specify the date of enforcement, which cannot extend beyond September 1, 2027.

The Board of Education Policy Committee will reconvene on May 5 to review data and refine the focus of the policy development.
