

We are using the above chart to help students understand and be accountable for dressing for recess according to the weather conditions at the time knowing that spring weather brings minute by minute changes. Please use this chart with your child as you help them prepare for the school day. Note that the temperatures listed on the chart refer to the "feels like" temperatures.

-Please be sure to mark your child's outdoor apparel with your child's initials so that lost items can be returned.



ARC Reading Practice

To record January at-home reading time, please use the <u>January At-Home Reading Log</u>
The At-Home Reading Logs will be in English on one side with Spanish on the other.
Teachers will either staple the calendar in your child's agenda or put it in their take home folder. Simply record your child's reading minutes each day and initial. Please remember that students are expected to read (or be read to) 2 steps (30 min) each night. <u>Currently, only 33% of our students are on target for At-Home Reading.</u>

At-Home Learning for Inclement Weather Days

Here are the expectations for At Home Learning Days for inclement/emergency school closures. This will take effect on the first closure and thereafter. At the elementary level, students should plan to learn at home with the following expectations below. All staff will be available via email on At Home Learning Days should you need further direction.

- 4 Year Old Kindergarten:
 - -Read to your child for 20 minutes
 - -Practice writing their name
 - -Practice writing their letters
 - -Practice writing their numbers
 - -Practice counting
 - -Practice identifying shapes

5 Year Old Kindergarten through 4th Grade:

- -Read for 20 minutes
- -Practice math facts or counting
- -Practice the skills card sent home from ARC while reading
- -If you have access to a device:
 - -Do iReady lessons in reading and Math
 - -Read from the ARC bookshelf
- -Participate in a physical activity shoveling, building a fort, sledding, cleaning your room, chores at home, etc.

GUIDANCE CLASS UPDATE

As part of our guidance curriculum, several community partners will be visiting over the next few months to give presentations to our students on essential aspects of personal safety, responsibility, and decision-making. We are grateful for our partnerships with these organizations and the expertise they bring to these important topics.

Officer Wilson from the New London Police Department will speak to 3rd and 4th graders about internet safety, focusing on strategies to stay safe while online.

NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) will present an introductory lesson on mental health and illness to 4th graders, explaining common conditions like depression and anxiety in a way that is developmentally appropriate for young students.

Harbor House, in partnership with the Sexual Assault Crisis Center (SACC), will continue to provide personal safety lessons for students in grades K-4, as they have done for over 30 years. These lessons are designed to be developmentally appropriate and emphasize a rules-based approach to safety in potentially dangerous or abusive situations, as research shows that young children benefit most from clear, concrete rules rather than relying on feelings alone. This instruction aligns with Wisconsin Statute 118.01(2)(d)8, which mandates that school boards provide instruction in "protective behaviors," including safety, avoiding dangerous or abusive situations, recognizing unsafe circumstances, understanding the right to personal safety, and knowing how to seek help.

These sessions ensure our students are equipped with the skills and knowledge to navigate challenging situations safely and responsibly, supporting statewide educational standards.

Any questions or concerns can be directed to these organizations, the school principal, or the school counselor.

In 1920, 14 years after her death, the 19th Amendment to the Constitution was ratified by three-fourths of the states and adopted, granting women the right to vote.
