



Fang's Reading Challenge

Fang's Reading Challenge is underway. Students will work to collect all four bases (1st, 2nd, 3rd, Home plate) of a baseball diamond by reading and filling out the log card for each base. Parents should monitor their child's reading and sign off on the card. These cards are turned in at the conclusion of each base as follows:

- -1st Base-February 26-March 17, Card due on March 18
- -2nd Base-March 18-31, Card Due April 1
 -3rd Base-April 1-14, Card Due April 15
 -Home Plate-April 15-28, Card due April 29
 With the completion of each card, students receive a small prize culminating in receiving a voucher for a game ticket, soda and hot dog with the completion of all four bases, which can be redeemed on the May 31st game.

Forward Exam-State Testing

Starting next week, we will begin state testing with the Forward Exam. This testing is computer based and will be taken by 3rd and 4th graders. They've been prepping for this for a few weeks now. 3rd Grade students will take only the English/Language Arts and Math portions of the Exam while 4th Grade students will take Science and Social Studies in addition to English Language Arts and Math. All students taking the Forward Exam should make sure to get a good night's sleep prior to taking the test and eat a good breakfast. Parent's should positively encourage their child to do well on the test and emphasize that the test is important. Following is a schedule for testing days:

Music

February brings the students' favorite activities! Kindergarten, First, and Second Grade will be starting or continuing their piano instruction. All of the students by the end of second grade will be able to label every key on the piano, re-understand how the piano works and is put together, and play through the C scale forward and backward.

Third and Fourth grade students are picking up their recorders! Third grade is just starting to learn how to make a good tone. They will eventually learn three notes, BAG, and combine them together to play through a few songs. Fourth grade will be starting their self guided Recorder Karate unit. All of the students will receive the first song and they are responsible for labeling the notes, learning how to play the notes, and putting it all together before they play for me. If they pass, then they get the next song up and continue the process

Art

In art, 3rd and 4th Grade are talking about clay and will be creating their clay projects soon. 2nd Grade is starting to explore different artists and getting inspiration from their work. 1st grade is almost done exploring the elements of art and will be moving on to the principles of art next! Kindergarten is finishing up the Poppy Project (a collaboration with the American Legion Auxiliary) to be put into an art competition set up by the Legion!

Techtime

Following our engineering projects in January, the students are now moving toward coding. The Kindergarten and First graders will be working their way through a fun interactive coding game called Code Spark. This will teach them basic coding language and techniques.

Second, Third, and Fourth grade will be working on their respective levels of a more advanced coding program called Code.Org. In this program the students will work more in a three dimensional work area and will ultimately code their own game.

Guidance

In the month of February we will focus on our character pillar of diversity. Our lessons always include showing kindness and empathy toward others. February 12th-16th is Kindness week and we will have fun dress up days and a kindness bingo sheet that will be sent home.

Phy Ed

Students have been working hard during our rolling unit. We have been using bowling balls to knock down pins and competing in a variety of team activities. I wanted to inform families as well that our Kids Heart Challenge annual fundraiser will begin on February 12th and conclude right about when Spring break is beginning. There will be plenty of information sent home with the students as well as information that can be accessed online! The discussion groups will be facilitated by individuals who have their own lived experience -- they know what you're going through because they've been there.

Register for the program by March 20, 2024 to receive information on how to view the six videos, and then participate in the discussion at the following meetings via Zoom:

- Wednesday, April 3, 2024, from 7-8 PM (classes 1 & 2 will be discussed)
- Wednesday, April 17, 2024, from 7-8 PM (classes 3 & 4 will be discussed)
- Wednesday, May 1, 2024, from 7-8 PM (classes 5 & 6 will be discussed)

The class and groups will cover the following topics, among others:

- Managing crises, solving problems and communicating effectively
- How to take care of yourself and handle stress
- Developing the confidence and stamina to support your child with compassion
- Advocating for your child's rights at school and in health care settings Learning about current treatments, including evidence-based therapies, medications and side
- Gaining an overview of the public mental health care, school and juvenile justice systems and supporting resources to help you navigate these systems
- Understanding the challenges and impact of mental health conditions on your entire family
