The Fuel Up team is wrapping up a stellar year at New London Middle School. They have successfully promoted healthy eating with taste testing and a snack smarter program, and they have encouraged kids to stay active by starting a walking club and revamping recess with new equipment.

The Wednesday Morning Walking Club became part of a play called *Road to the SuperBowl*. Using QR codes, the team scanned each lap students completed, totaling over 600 miles and including the team in a raffle for an NFL prize basket...which they won! The team was able to purchase many Packer items for an end of the year walking club raffle for the entire school with the gift card.

Science, Technology, Engineering, Math

Middle School students who recently competed in the second annual Mathematical Problem Solving contest at UW Oshkosh understand the importance of developing strong critical thinking and interpersonal communication skills. This group of 17 seventh grade students and 17 eighth grade students participated in both individual and small group competitions that focused on students' ability to reason and make sense of novel mathematical problems of various levels of difficulty.

After the morning competitions, students were able to engage in sessions ranging from a medical technology demonstration on hematology where students learned about types of blood and its components to a forensic anthropology demonstration where students analyzed skeletal remains and learned how this information could help solve criminal investigations. Students also enjoyed playing fun math games in the math exploration center and watching *Face Off*, a live math game show.

Special congratulations go out to Brianna Gossen and Adam McGlin for earning a place in the top 10% of participants at the seventh grade level and to eighth grade team members, Chayton Behnke, Maribel Glodowski, Grant Roe, and Alaena Wolf, for performing in the top 10% of all middle school teams.

COUNTY YOUTH GOVERNMENT DAY

The term, emergency, was a recurring theme throughout this year's Waupaca County Youth Government Day. Sponsored by the American Legion, County Youth Government Day affords students the opportunity to learn about state and local government and, by doing so, promotes citizenship and effective government. A total of 115 students from five area high schools (including twentyfour freshmen from New London High School) attended this year's program in Waupaca.

Many functions of county government are routine. Registrations, record keeping, road maintenance, tax collection, and human resources are usually emergency-free. But there are times, such as the 1996 Weyauwega train derailment or the recent record-setting spring blizzard, when local officials must deal with extraordinary circumstances. Wisconsin State Statute 323.14 requires that "each county board shall designate a head of emergency management" to deal with such situations. In Waupaca County, Emergency Management Director Andrew Carline and Deputy

Director Eric Halverson are the go-to crew, and both shared their knowledge and experiences with the Youth Government Day participants.

Students also saw examples of emergency preparedness and management within Waupaca County government. The Communications Center handles thousands of 911 calls annually; the Jail Division processes and houses hundreds of inmates; the Patrol Division possesses an MRAP vehicle if the need arises; and the three branches of the County Court system utilize a Drug Court to deal with the drug crisis in the area.

Waupaca County Youth Government Day is in its 58th year and is one of the longest running County Youth Government Day programs in Wisconsin. It is possible only through the time and effort of countless organizations, professionals, and volunteers. NLHS students thank everyone involved for making County Youth Government Day such a meaningful experience.

Expressing Gratitude

In 1962, President John F. Kennedy designated May 15 as Peace Officers' Memorial Day, and the week in which May 15 falls as National Police Week in honor of the service and sacrifice of law enforcement officers.
