Members, Peter Gorman, Sarah Heideman, RaeAnn Radcliffe, Jeff Smolinski, and Abby Weyland listened to multiple speakers address crop production including when to plant, how deep to plant, plant residue, tillage options, soil conditions, plant conditions, and size and location of corn cob. Members were interactive with some equipment and participated in the field. After they collected notes on the topics discussed, they could work as a team to take a 45 question test in 25 minutes. The first place team received \$1000 for their chapter in September!





Sources of Strength

On Thursday, October 18, 2018, over 60 NLHS students and 9 adult advisors participated in Peer Leader Training facilitated by Carlyn Andrews of the Boys and Girls Club. Sources of Strength is a universal suicide prevention program designed to build socioecological protective influences around youth and to reduce the likelihood that vulnerable youth/young adults will become suicidal. During the training, participants were encouraged to identify areas of hope, help, and strength available in their lives, helping them build resiliency to life's adversities. Students formed subcommittees to develop ideas for Sources of Strength campaigns to be promoted approximately five times throughout the school year.









## ROMBERG'S HOST PUMPKIN PICKING

Mrs. Spencer teaches the Functional Skills class at New London High School which consists of providing a variety of community and classroom experiences to educate students. In this activity, the Romberg family invited Mrs. Spencer's class to pick pumpkins, which was an incredibly fun Fall activity. #### One to One Initiative at ISMS



The year is off to a great start with the *One to One* Chromebook rollout at the Intermediate/Middle School! Students have been able to accomplish many great things at school and at home with their Chromebooks. Many teachers are continuing to incorporate digital learning activities in their lessons that make the Chromebook a vital tool for all of our students.

We are looking forward to the beginning of the 2nd quarter in which we are planning on our 5th-grade students starting to bring their devices home to charge and provide access to complete homework and assigned activities.





This school year grades K-4 are piloting a new science program called, Mystery Science. The program's mission is to help children stay curious and encourages children to investigate the mysteries of our endlessly fascinating world! The Mystery Science curriculum focuses on nurturing children's natural curiosities which then naturally fosters children's scientific perspective on the world. Ability to think scientifically is fundamental to any career or subject our young learners choose to pursue. Mystery Science helps our students have the ability to look at a question or problem, systematically investigate and collect evidence, and come to an independent conclusion. Mystery Science is also aligned with the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). Not only is all of this great, but our students are having a blast investigating and solving mysteries!

Second graders began the year solving mysteries surrounding properties of materials in their unit, "Material Magic." The unit developed the idea that by taking advantage of the properties of materials, we can solve many problems in our lives. Students developed an appreciation for the man-made materials of everyday objects, and learned to recognize that those materials are chosen based on their properties. Through hands-on investigations, students explored the material properties involved in meeting basic needs (such as clothing and cooking). They considered the solid and liquid states of matter to understand why plastic was invented. The unit ended with a brainstorming activity about futuristic inventions that might be possible using new materials.

First graders' first unit was "Spinning Sky: Sun, Moon, and Stars." The unit helped students develop the idea that the sun, moon, and stars change position in the sky in ways that are fun to watch and predict.







First graders worked hard to find out what their shadows did when they weren't looking. They traced their shadows and came back to see if their shadows moved at all throughout the day.
