Title IX Update

The Wisconsin Association of School Boards recently updated its members on the current status of Title IX recommendations.

The U.S. Department of Education's 2024 amendments to the Title IX regulations took effect on August 1, 2024. However, the status of the 2024 regulations depends on the evolving status (and eventual outcome) of pending litigation over the 2024 amendments. For example, litigation originating in federal court in the District of Kansas has resulted in an injunction that currently prohibits the U.S. Department of Education from enforcing the 2024 Title IX regulations against some K-12 schools that are located in Wisconsin. The injunction against enforcement by the U.S. Department of Education creates uncertainty regarding how at least some school districts may choose to approach the implementation of the 2024 regulations.

In August, we updated the Board from the Facilities Committee about the potential of working with Boldt to construct a concession / bathroom space at the stadium. The timeline and cost Boldt was proposing for immediately beginning the work did not work in our planning for the possible project.

We spoke to Somerville in September about the project and they plan to design schematic plans, elevations, renderings and the opinion of probable cost for the project scope. These will help facilitate further discussion and continue to gather information about the potential of this project.

<u>Caring Closet Continues to Operate in All</u> <u>Buildings</u>

The Caring Closet (overseen by our school counselors and social worker) continues to operate in all buildings.

Items that are stocked include:

- Hygiene Items (shampoo, conditioner, body wash, toothbrushes, toothpaste, deodorant, feminine hygiene products)
- Clothing
- Socks, underwear
- Food items (limited) Students who need food items for the weekend, are signed up for Project Backpack. There are currently 120 students utilizing the Project Backpack program.

Thanks to the generosity of local businesses and families in the community, the Caring Closets allow students to have their immediate needs met during the school day.

Change in Annual State School Report Card Terminology

The Wisconsin Department of Public Education recently updated its annual school report card terminology to clarify academic progress assessment.



Department of Public Instruction:

DPI focuses on growth-based mindset in updated student performance level descriptors for standardized assessments

"Overwhelming feedback in survey guides first update to terminology in nearly 10 years"

Following months of extensive engagement with internal and external education partners, the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction is updating terminology used to describe performance

levels on required statewide standardized assessments. The updated terms are intended to foster conversations promoting student potential and growth at every level.

"During my time as superintendent and dating back to when I was a district administrator, I've often heard confusion from parents, families, and legislators on what performance terms on tests meant in regard to where students are at academically," State Superintendent Dr. Jill Underly said. "We really wanted to hear from our experts, our educators, on how they talk about student performance on tests and try to use the language they use. This updated terminology is not only clearer, it also recognizes the endless potential each of our students has as learners."

The terms developing, approaching, meeting, and advanced will replace the previous terms that have been used since 2014-15 – below basic, basic, proficient, and advanced. These updated terms will be used moving forward (beginning with assessments from the 2023-24 school year) on student reports for the Forward Exam, in addition to school, district, and state secure and public reports for the Forward Exam, ACT, and PreACT Secure.
